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Tuesday April 27th

Disturbed night, heavy rifle fire

Much same as yesterday, enemy

fire much heavier. Casualty

Capt J. F. Walsh 15th killed

^{SE} J. Byrne. Enemy went face bayonet

^{SE} Several wounded. A bloody day.

Wednesday April 28th

Fairly quiet night, some sniping

Affairs in our fire benches much

same as Tuesday. Moral of

our men (15th) excellent.

Night wet & cold. Do not know

where Battalion Hdqrs. are.

Thursday April 29th

Relieved by R.M.H.I. at 7 am

to give our men a rest down

in gully. Brigade Hdqrs. busy

getting Battalions together.

Outpost at night on open

ridge. Nearly done up for want of

sleep & rest.

Friday 30th April

Neg's birthday.

Endeavouring to get Bn. concentrated

Col. Cannan & Adjutant. 10 am

5 pm. A Coy ordered to reinforce

R.M. Trepel threatened attack,

Casualties three wounded

7 pm. returned to Hdqrs. & proceeded

to ridge held by 16th relieving

them. Position some 100 ft. front.

Sniping during night, supports

digging in.

Saturday May 1st

Men very sleepy. Capt. Moran

slightly wounded in leg & one

man flesh wound in neck.

Enemy very quiet in front of us.

Heavy shrapnel fire on centre-right

Casualties in front. 3 wounded &

1 killed M.G. Section.

Fairly quiet night, some sniping

Turkish attacks lack push &

are feeble

Sunday May 2nd
Still occupying same trenches,
very quiet, only sniping.
Observed enemy entrenching 500'
from our position & informed artillery.
Weather, bright & sunny, but cold
at night. Turks poor fighters.
Advance by our troops to new position
in front, partially successful.
Heavy firing all night.

Monday May 3rd
Heavy day. Capt. Willis &
Pte. Bennett killed. 1 Cpl. Watson
wounded in neck.

Smell of dead Turks in front
most offensive. Held position
all day, relieved at midnight.

Tuesday May 4th
McDont & Byrne killed, wounded former
arms, latter leg. Saw Harry
Murray, still going strong.
Much sniping, several casualties.

Wednesday May 5th (Rayment^W)
In Bivouac. Many casualties
from unaimed fire (rifle & maxim)
& sniping. Cpl. Dunn returned.

Thursday May 6th
Shifted Bivouac up Gully.
206 Pte. Thomson, A.F. wounded by
unaimed rifle fire. Improving fire
trenches & resting Battalion.
Quinn's Co. to Trenches at 5 pm.
Enemy very quiet all day. Short
burst of heavy fire at night.

Friday May 7th
Lieut. Armstrong & 53 men arrived from
Alexandria to reinforce Battalion.
Bathing parade for "A" Co.

Trench digging on hill in relief.

Saturday May 8th
5 pm. Relieved Quinn's men on hill.
Fairly quiet night, some bomb throwing
& sniping. Several Turks shot at
down. Lieut. Anderson killed
by shell.

Sunday May 9th
Night attack on enemy's
trenches, inflicted heavy loss
on him. Own casualties severe.
Lieut. H. Armstrong, F. L. Armstrong
& E. Wareham, G. Hinman
killed. Lieut. Harry, R. Casey,
Collins, Svensen, Yewdon &
Smith ^{killed} wounded.

No 2 platoon. wounded 11 men
3 missing. Self slightly
wounded in shoulder, 3 shovels I
was carrying undoubtedly saved
my life. Assault was successful
I would have been complete, had
the left of Armstrong's F. L. & Smith's
not been connected up.

Young Henry Anderson had only been
ashore 24 hours & was dreadfully
mutilated by shell, died 20 minutes
after. Both Armstrongs killed on the
spot, also Wareham. Young

Hinman died most gallantly
leading his men, body not
recovered. Casey dreadfully
hurt by a bomb, has a chance
of recovery. Sam Harry &
Svensen's wounds severe, but
both may recover. Wareham's
body not recovered. Collins is still
missing. Up till retirement
our casualties slight, during
retirement very heavy, principally
machine gun & bomb. Many
picks & shovels lost & I fear
much ammunition. Never
thought to come out alive & marvel
at narrow escapes. Jacket &
shirt torn by bullets, haversack
& water bottle riddled. Shoulder
very painful, but still fit to do
my duty. Thank God for all
his mercies. Letter from my
darling dated 21/3/15 God bless
& keep her & our lads.

Monday 10th May.

Relieved at Quinn's Post at 11 am by 16th Bn. Returned to Gully after burying dead to have Roll Call & reorganize Battalion. Nearly all our wounded brought back into our own lines, for which all are devoutly thankful. Notwithstanding severe mauling & punishment the Morale of our Regt. is good & the men heroes. Many & many an act was performed worthy of V.C. or D.C.M. so very many that one cannot individualize. Thank God that Australia breeds such heroes. Losses amongst officers terribly severe, do not expect to come through alive. Since 25th April have been constantly in danger of a sudden & probably dreadful death, the past 16 days on looking back seem like a nightmare or bad dream.

Thank God, my nerve has held & I've been calm & collected all through. But want of sleep & the constant strain have been very trying & one has ever to keep his mind on his duty & think of for one's men. These men of the 15th are glorious fellows it hurts one dreadfully to see them getting mangled & killed. Proud am I to be with such noble fellows, ever since the first night. (Sunday 25/4/15) They have behaved like veterans. Would to God all our Regiments were the same, of some the less said the better. Officers of the 15th were an exceptional lot, I think as well as the men & when our record sees the light of day, all will agree that the 15th did their duty & more so. Please God we get some sleep this night. Wonder shall I live to see my loved ones again.

Tuesday May 11th

A good night's sleep for all, only one alarm at 4 a.m. General Birdwood praised the 15th to-day for their good work on Sunday night, our loss something over 100 killed, wounded & missing & such men too, good all round.

Colonel much cut up, poor chap, looks quite worn out. Harry Murray I saw to-day & thank God he is still spared, has been mentioned in despatches & rightly so.

Battalion to have a rest till tomorrow morning. At Roll Call many faces missing, God rest their souls, they died nobly & took heavy toll from the enemy before they died. Letter from my dear wife & Meg to-day dated 23/3/15 & one from Niah 7/4/15 which was

addressed to G.O. London

Shoulder still very painful but healing healthily. Weather shows signs of breaking, troops very free from sickness, few cases of dysentery. All have Colds of course, as we have no blankets only our great coats.

No news of the outside world at all & everybody wonders how things are going on the Continent & at the S end of the Peninsula. Shrapnel & shay bullets still falling round our position, several casualties. Sgt. Williams shot through the leg. P.S.M. King, G.W.S. Brown, Sgt. Koch & Munday promoted 2 Lieuts. Colonel & Major Carter looking sad & care worn. Lieut Sam Harry dead, dear cherry Sammy. Night wet & cold, little sleep.

Wed. May 12th

Wound in shoulder painful,
Rheumatizing also very trying,
ground a horrible quagmire.
My beloved's & Meg's letters a
great comfort indeed, but make
a fellow beastly homesick.
How one would love to see them
all again, if only for a moment.
Saw them all in my troubled
& fitful sleep last night. To
the firing line again to night,
God who has watched over me
so far will do so still.

"Redeem thy mis-spent time that is
past,

And live this day as if thy last"
& it very well may be. God
grant that I face all that may
befall me, cheerfully & with
calmness. My boys are simply
grand, cool & steadfast, I'm

proud to be with such men.

Heard that Lieut. Smith is dead,
Capt. Davies may lose his foot,
ankle bone shattered, Major
Snowden's, Capt. Moran &
Capt. Richardson's wounds are
slight. Lieut. Dickson died of
wounds, Lieut. Robertson is
missing & I fear dead.

Lieut. Dickinson will recover,
but loses one eye & may lose his
sight. Pres. Nyshom, Knight,
& Groom of my Platoon are
missing & I fear the worst.

This thick broken country very
difficult for night operations.

Our Coy. accounted for over
200 Turks with the bayonet
on Sunday night; they are poor
fighters at close quarters, but
we good with artillery & machine
guns. Our Artillery singularly
infectious & futile. Give us no

assistance at all. Have already
killed & wounded several of
our own men by premature
bursts of shell. Dick's birthday.

Thursday, May 13th

Quinn's Post. Trying night much
bomb throwing otherwise quiet.

Friday May 14th

Relieved by L.H. & subsequently
relieved them again to make a
reconnaissance at 1 a.m. L.H. failed
to make good their objective.

Major Graham killed, Capt. Burbeck
wounded, other casualties 23-79

Sat. May 15th

Relieved by 16th Bn at 4 a.m. &
returned to valley. Men very
hardworked by fatigues.

Health generally astonishingly
good, very little sickness.

Water keeps very good &
food supplies excellent.

Sunday May 16th

Reconnaissance with C.O. Capkannan
Capt. Quinn to I.M. Battery position,
very extended view, narrow shave
from a Turkish shell. P.M. Same
party + M.O. to hill at rear
of brown & wooded country.
Enemy trenches many & extensive.
No outside news, except that
enemy torpedoed the "Lusitania"
off Queenstown.

Monday May 17th

To the trenches at 10 a.m.

Fairly quiet night, feeble attack
by enemy on left, easily repulsed.

Ck. Bowdman killed. Six
slight casualties from bombs.

No slap 1/c No. 1 Section

Tuesday May 18th

In trenches, busy making
improvements, overhead
cables etc & loopholes.

Wed. May 19th

Enemy made vigorous & general attack all along our lines. Attack developed full strength about 6 am. everywhere repulsed with heavy loss. Our casualties in comparison were light (47)

Lieut. Sparkes injured by bomb, will lose left hand. Cpl. Brennan killed. Counted 49 Turkish dead on our right position.

2 p.m. relieved by 13th & I. H.

Turned out at 9 p.m. to reinforce Quinn's Post. Broken night.

Letter No 4 from Chummy & one from Meg. All well at home.

Thursday May 20th

In bivouac. Turnished fatigues at various points. Men very tired. Alarm at midnight & kept on road remainder of night.

Friday May 21st

Lieut. Hill & transport party arrived from Lemnos. Quiet day. Several Turks surrendered. Quiet night, usual "Stand to arms" at 3-45 am.

Sat. May 22nd

In bivouac, men much rested. Fresh meat & condensed milk issued. Quiet night.

Sunday May 23rd

2nd Shave since landing & first hair cut. Relieved Quinn's Post at 11 am. Works & improvements progressing. About 5 p.m. some bomb throwing indulged in by enemy, no one hurt. Fairly quiet night, much bomb throwing at dawn. Letter No 5 from Chummy & paper, two letters from Mother & one from Meg. Very, very tired & sleepy.

Monday May 24th

A most extraordinary day.
Armistice from 7-30 am. to 4-30 pm.
for purposes of burying dead, many
of whom had been dead weeks.
Turks squizzed us critically & we
likewise. The quiet felt most strange
& sort of impressive, not a shot.

Three of ours shot about 8 am.?
Many rifles & much equipment
picked up. Burial parties worked
quietly & well. Turkish dead
along our front about 3000
Hinnan's body found &
buried by Chaplain.

4-30 pm hostilities recommenced
fairly quiet night, no casualties.

Tuesday May 25th

Discovered Turks are mining
at Quinn's Post, started
countermining. Relieved
at 12 noon. Stood to

arms at 2 pm.

5 pm To Quinn's Post as Reserve
Night in Pirouac.

Ave inspiring sight HMS
Triumph sunk by submarine
in the bay, nearly all hands
saved by T. B. D's & trawlers
Wednesday May 26th

Lieut Yeardon & 31 men from
Hermes for duty. 5 dead wounded
In Pirouac stood to arms
during day when our
miners were firing shots.
Fatigues & outpost
Thursday May 27th

Capt. Cannon, sick, self
acting O.C. "A" Coy. Lt. Mundell
sick, forsilikes. Aeroplane
dropped bombs on Turks Hdqrs.
Usual routine. Quiet day
Several casualties from snipers.
Slight dysentery & piles, feel weak,
headaches, mostly neuralgia I think.

Friday May 28th

Turned out last night at midnight. No 1 Platoon each Coy. to Hill. Received 5th men reinforcements for No 2. Collecting equipment & arms & cleaning up bivouac. Turks very quiet last two days. Still mining on both sides, believe two of their miners trapped by explosion of our charge.

Heard to-day that H.M.S. Majestic was sunk at Cape Helles, crew saved. Italy has come in at last. Read to-day very interesting diary of a Turkish officer, covered period from 25/4/15 to 20/4/15, mentions no of Regts. & Divs. against us.

Letter No 6. from Chummy all are well at home.

Enemy snipers active to-day, several casualties in Valley.

Brigadier Monash gone for a rest, guess he needs ^{it?} never in a trench since landing, bar armistice day. Col. Cannan on board. Canadians for a few days well earned rest. Capt. Cannan & Lieut. Mundell still very far from well. Rheumatism very bad last two days, struggle to keep going.

Sat 29th May

Turned out at 3 am.

Fierce enemy attack on Quinn's Post. Turks blew in No 3 Section of Trench & then rushed position & gained portion of Trench & Bomb proof shelter. Bloody struggle till 10 am. when attack finally beaten off. 19 Turks prisoners & 27 killed in our trench. Their loss very heavy many dead in front.

Major Quinn killed &
Lieut Koch, Leitch & Thistle
badly wounded, 15th
casualties about 50.

At 11 am. relieved 13th in NO 2
Section. Self + Lieut Robinson
N.Z.R. taking over Post with 20
men each. Believe 15th were asleep this AM.
Fairly quiet night. Some bombs.
Sunday 30th May.

Very scurvy treatment to
our men by Col. Pope,
no relief. At 1 pm.

L.H. 2 officers + 60 men attack-
ed advanced Turkish work
on Pope's orders. Madness.
Failed in its object, behaviour of
L.H. splendid.

Col. Cannan insisted on our
relief at 7 pm. returned
to Rivonac. Men just
worn out with fatigue.
Self half dead with exhaustion.

Monday May 31st.

"A" Coy to Beach, am
only officer for duty.
C. in Hospital on beach.
All hands had swim
& good night sleep & rest.
Rest of Batta. to come
down to-morrow.

Tuesday 1st June
Capt. Moran returned.
Visited Capt. Cannan
in Hospital. View from
this valley magnificent.
Have been recommended
for Captaincy by Colonel.
Had tea with Capt. Litcher, he
is Beach Adjutant & heard
much news. He presented
me with a pair socks & puttees.

Wednesday June 2nd
Remainder of Batta. arrived
Reported to Dato. Sre Kito

of officers + men. Dryner
with Liddle + met Paddy
Clerke of L.H. who is well.

Brigade addressed by General
Godley, praised us no end.

Scotty Wright + Corbett to get
D.C.M. + don't they deserve it
Endeavouring to get discipline
back + absorbing Reinf's
Good nights rest, dog tired.

Thursday. June 3rd.

Our wedding day.

Batt. inlying picquet from
8 a.m. to 8 a.m. to-morrow.
Hard problem to decide
on what lines to run Coy
whether as 2, 3, or 4 platoons.
Strength is 1 officer (ref) + 144 others
20 Reinforcements + including 1st Lt
NCO question is a difficult one.

Nearly all Sgts are away sick
or wounded, mean time privates +
 Lance Jacks do the work + cannot
be promoted, hard lines. Then
Reinf. NCOs arrive + complicate it
still further. Interviewed C.O. on this
question, he can do nothing.

Friday June 4th

Fatigues nothing but fatigue.

They are asking too much from this
Battalion + C.O. won't battle for us.

Heroic attack at Quinn's Post, near
Canterbury had rough time, they
took 30 Turks prisoner.

Very heavy day. Capt. Camran no better.

Saturday June 5th

Fatigues continuously, digging new
sap out to Beach Barricade.
Men very tired + fed up
Beautiful syllabus of work etc by
C.O. a farce, all men on fatigue
Men getting soured. Bad

Sunday, 6 June

More fatigues, all day.
Thank heaven we are only on
picquet to-morrow & so may
get some rest. No authentic news
from outside world & no mail
for a fortnight. Our men could
not attend church service, owing
to all being on fatigue. Men of
other Bns. at church, broke down
our lavatories & pilfered our water &
other belongings. Heavy firing at night.
Bad night, could not sleep.

Monday 7th June

Capt. Canham & batman to Lemnos
Very warm weather, health of our
troops excellent, very little
sickness or malingering
Men getting some rest to-day.
Battalion turned out in fighting
order at short notice in 3¹/₂ mins
Very good performance

Tuesday 8th June

Refreshing swim at 9 am.
Col. informed me I am promoted
Captain to date from May 10th
since poor Sam Harry killed in
action. Wrote Chummy & P.C.
to Mother. Weather hot.
N.Z. having tough time at our
old haunt Quinn's Post.
No authentic news from outside
world. Mail in, nothing for Sunday.
John Hall promoted Capt.
L. Cpl. Storey to be Corporal
L. Cpl. Myles H. " "
Corpl. Carter " " Lance Serjt
L. Cpl. Allsop J. " " Corporal
Capt. Richardson " " Major
Must impress on all ranks the
absolute necessity of cleanliness
in lavatories & around cooking places.
All S.A.A. must be picked up.

Wednesday June 9th

Undisturbed night, could not sleep, neuralgia.

Weather hot. Practically whole of A Coy on fatigue. Water supply for drinking limited 1/2 Gall. per man per diem. Dry canteen to be opened on beach. Visited beach & saw Litter, heard much news; met Aspinall 12th Bn. is in charge of their M.G. Section. Accompanied C.O. & Major Carter to left position & viewed country in direction of Bizjak - Anafarta village & hill 970. Turks appear to be well entrenched & saw some traces of barbed wire. Italian & Austrian forces in contact & America is talking re "Lusitania". German reply "Go to hell" or words to that effect.

Thursday June 10th

Brigade Captain of the day. Accompanied M.O. on tour of inspection, many jam & beef tins lying around & food. This shows sheer ignorance on part of men & slackness on part of their officers. Dirt breeds flies, flies breed disease. If they had seen what I witnessed in Dörmföhr 15 years ago, guess they would need no telling as to importance of absolute cleanliness. Corp. H. Myles wounded last night whilst on fatigue, slightly in chest & arm. Private R. Wilde to Hospital to be segregated, has had enteric within past nine months. Capt. Cannon still sick. Brother officers congratulated me on promotion all save Horne. He was honest anyway.

Authentic news very scant.
We must be patient hanging
on to the ground won.

Progress in the South is slow,
hear Lemnos is full of fresh
troops & another Australian
Division on the water.

Usual fatigues & of course the
usual "lakineograms" on the go.
Letter from Sgt. Tichner is in
Albasich School, Hops Alexandria
thinks to be back soon. Sgt. Mitchell
is there will be two months at
least before he can eat hard
food, jaw was badly broken.
Wrote Tichner & asked for news
of others wounded & sick.

Friday June 11th

Battalion in lying picquet

Quiet day. Very little shrapnel
Sleepless night, must be nerves.

Sat. June 12th

Usual fatigues.
Letters Nov 7+8 from Jen,
little did they think we
were fighting at time of
writing. Capt. Cannan returned.
Tobacco from Little.

Sunday June 13th

Divine Service 9 a.m. for
4th Brigade.

Thank God for all his mercies
to me. Kiddis & wife all
well. Letter from Mother.
News of outside world scant.
M.A. laughing stock of the
world. Peace at any price

Monday 14 June

Appointed O.C. Bomb Throwing
Section, 10 men per Coy. to be
practised in bomb throwing.
Quiet day. Sleepless night, cannot
sleep.

Tuesday 15th June

Battalion lying picquet
Turned out smartly.

Weather hot & flies a pest.

Better night.

Wed. 16th June

Showery. 50 Reinforcements.

Hanley & Smith returned from
Sir Dan's Bodyguard.

Young Geo. Sutherland came
from Anzac Cove to visit me.

Looks well & very fit, said
"he had heard I was hit &
killed several times" asked
me if I remembered Mr. R.

Sampson picking up horse
shoe at Claremont, he
attributes my good fortune
from sudden death to it.

Enemy's gun on left our
position very persistent

with shrapnel. Killed 2
& wounded 3 in 16th Nov.

bivouac. Our own artillery
& T.B.D.'s seem impotent
to silence this gun. has
now turned its attention
to the Beach thank goodness.
Rumours of all sorts flying
about to-day, no official
news of any kind.

Dreams of home & Chummy
so very vivid lately & again
that ever recurring question
comes into one's mind "shall
I come through this hell &
hold them close again." Please
God Chummy is not worrying
herself ill about her old hubby.
Notice that Casualties are
being given Australian press
in dribs & drabs, if they only
knew the whole truth

Bugler Crosby wrote from
Valetha Hospital, Malta. Poor
boy was very badly knocked
about by a bomb in thigh,
arm, stomach & top of
penis blown off, suffered
agony, but is mending, expects
to be invalided to Australia.

Shifted my bivouac & made
arrangements for new cooking
place. Turkish prisoners
taken on Gallipoli: -

includes Six Germans &
29 Greeks.

Water fatigues to be done

Can obtain no news of

Thursday June 17th
Restless night, very heavy rifle
& machine gun fire & sound of
heavy guns from the south.
Shrapnel falling near
bivouac & one man wounded
by case striking him on the
stern as he lay in his dug out.
Garrison. Capt. Cannan to 9th Bn.
lines with Nicky O'Brien
Reinforcements a difficult
problem, badly in need of
training. Space, time & opportunity
for training very limited,
run round Helles Bns. may go
to Imbros for three or four
days at a time for this
purpose. Good scheme if found
practicable. Late telegram that
HMS Canopus is sunk by
submarine at Cape Helles.
Enemy gun towards Sal A

Lake very persistent in
shelling beach & mule lines.
The effect of shrapnel may
be more moral than material
as per manuals, but from
personal observation in many
instances the material damage
has been no small thing.
To wit - 16th Bn. Cookhouse -
1-10 ft. Shell - 2 killed & wounded
two of whom since died, is
pretty good for one little gun in
one shot. Own artillery & boats
quite unable to locate this
gun. Bathing parade this
p.m. a most exciting affair,
beach being shelled by enemy
continually, casualties
however were slight.
Army Corps to adopt trench
system of line e.c. from

1 to 24 o'clock e.g. 4-30 p.m.
would be shown thus
16.30. 9-15 a.m. thus 09.15
1 p.m. thus 13.00 & so on.
On way to beach with our
swimming party, shell burst
in our midst, near the Gap
head, an Indian very badly
wounded & two of our boys
slightly, Marvellous escape.
Quiet night, rather cold
Friday June 18th
Very hot, everyone looking fagged.
Wrote Chummy & Mother
From 9 a.m. till 10-30 enemy shelled
bivouac, only one casualty, hit by
Case on shoulder (Courtney Wm)
Met Major Pinell at 4-30 p.m. on the
Harrow Edge by appointment, in company
with Capt. H. L. G. Combes, Davey,
Atkinson & Fish, to reconnoitre
position for new fire trench
Anniversary Waterloo. 100 years ago

At 8 p.m. in charge party
of 100 men with Davey & Thomas
to Razor Edge worked till 12 p.m.
relieved by Hill & party.

No casualties, Thank God.
Issue of Rum on return.
Feel rotten, feverish & hummy out of
order. Sleeps very fitful.

Saturday June 19th
15th Inlying picquet.
Battalion turned out very
smartly on each Alarm.

This a pest to Raphael also
Sunday June 20th

Divine Service. Gen. Godley
present. Rumour re "Campfires"
is unfounded. Position & state
of affairs in the S. very unsatisfactory,
predict a move from here soon,
where in writer's humble opinion
the main effort should have
been made in the first place

We shall seem to follow the
Bull at a Gate method &
Generalship is conspicuous
by its absence. Heard to-
day that Quinton Smith
is dead, died under amputation,
Smithy was one of the best.
Had a yarn with Litter to-day,
he is somewhat pessimistic,
reckons Atki Paba will not be
taken.

At 11 P.M. heard two very heavy
explosions & then heavy rifle
fire, lasted till midnight &
then died away.

Good night, Sleep.
Monday June 21st

Midsummer's Day in England &
pretty well so here, very hot
& close, this most trying,
canteen supplies very scant,
impossible to buy matches, milk

or tobacco, only smoke to be
had. Captain medium
Tuesday June 22nd
Heard from S. that French
have made a forward move-
ment & gained "the Haricot"
& two lines of Turkish trenches &
were still holding them. Pleasant
swim with Capt. Gannan.
Lieut. W. W. Coombs posted to A.
Lieut. Eather arrived from Egypt
& posted to our company.
boombo 3 & 4 Platoons
Eather 1 & 2 " " " " " " " " " " " "

Lieut Dickinson returned from Heliopolis, he saw Harry Murray who is doing well & will soon be fit again.

Bomb throwing now off owing to indisposition of G.O.C.

Self & 50 men on fatigue digging track up to Bignell Ridge

Saturday 26th June

Mail in, no luck one letter from Bill, who can tell me nothing but Dennis, finds & motor rides, hardly mentions our doings here, wrote him a stiff line & asked what he & others are doing about the war.

Sunday June 27th

Divine Service. Balthus. Inlying frequent. Very hot. Met Capt. Halker N.Z.R. from Hospital looking well & fit; last time I saw him never expected to see him alive again; he was wounded by bombs at Quinn's Post & was an awful sight.

Great news, read in order to-day that Harry Murray has received the D.C.M. Wrote to him, he is at Abbassieh Hospital, Alexandria. Glorious swim in the cool of the evening. Lieut Eather very sick, advised him to see a doctor.

No news of the outside world.

Monday June 28th

O God, I've lost my one & only pipe, alas! I am undone & to buy one is impossible, I could weep. Heavy bombardment

down South by 1 Battleship,
1 Cruiser + 10 T.B.D.^s, appear
to be landing troops from
Transports. Turks in front
of Anzac very quiet save for
occasional spurk of shrapnel
from W hill & the Olive Grove,
these two guns defy all efforts to
silence them. Am happy once
more, Lieut. Eather has loaned me
an old pipe, which after sterilizing
in hot water, I find smokes
tolerably. C.O. & Capt. Cannan
a pair of gloomy pessimists should
be careful when expressing them-
selves in such Jeremiah strains
in front of young & untired officers,
may have bad effect & certainly can
do no good. We've got to see this
thing through anyhow, so may
just as well keep smiling until
knocked out, as wear a doleful mug.

Wish our chaps would not
use the name of Jesus so freely,
it sounds horrible, just habit
& thoughtlessness, shall speak to
them about it. Service yesterday
good & old hymn tunes, remindful
of home & Mother at the piano
on Sundays. A Private of 14th
cut in half by shell near our bivouac
& another shell killed one & wounded
17 other men, warm time while it
lasted. War is a strange thing &
man a queer mixture. To witness
a bad street accident at home in
ordinary every day life would make
you feel ill or sick & food distasteful.
Here a man wallows in bloody
sights & gruesome spectacles & he
calmly munches a biscuit all
the while, stranger. In the midst
of life we are in death says the
old book & how true here.

Monday June 28th

Heavy bombardment in the South, hear fresh troops are landing. 9th Bn. Home Light Horse made demonstration in front of Gaba Tepe, they had 250 casualties. Capt Jones & Lieut Bampf wounded.

Attack in South, successful about 900 yards gained & position made good.

Swim at 8 p.m. Delightful
Tuesday June 29th

Usual fatigues, & usual doses of shrapnel from Anafarta. Much road making & widening of saps. Sir Sam arrived & went over our positions.

Rupert Raftery, paid me a visit, is now Captain, we went out & he showed me
→ Bomb throwing for Gen. Godley's benefit

his landing place & explained subsequent movements.

Delighted to see him, he is very well & fit. Swim at 8 p.m. & afterwards very heavy dust-storm. Attack by Turks on No. 4 Section of Defence repulsed with heavy loss, 11 Turks taken prisoner & 8 wounded brought in. Turks lost fully 80 killed some 40 being visible from front trench.

Wednesday June 30th

Dearest's Birthday, sent P.C. Pronounced advance in the S. 29th Divn. once more covered itself with honour, gained 5 lines of Turkish trenches. French also made a forward move. Weather very rough, lightest boats adrift in the bay. Heavy rainstorm at night &

Spent night uncomfortably with
a wet bottom; have a cold
& rheumatism in consequence

Thursday July 1st

Slying Picquet. Weather fine
Rain issue. Rattle turned
out at 2000 o'clock very
smartly Time 3 mins.

All hands about sick of this
deadly inaction & many men
going on sick report with more
or less minor complaints.

Chief disease is a most insidious
one, I call it "They've been
here long enough Fever" Have
always doubted our staying
powers, can the Australian stay?
Time alone will tell.

The weather being hot & close of course
makes fellows feel tired, languid
& listless & dearth of reading matter

or interesting occupation, tends
to aggravate matters. Sooner
this Brigade is in the firing line
the better, it will right itself then.
Hear that the 1st Div has gone to
Imbros for a change of training.

Pamphlets scattered by enemy's
aeroplane over our lines pointing
out that as sensible people
we should surrender etc

Friday July 2nd.

Last Wednesday 14th inst, I
shoved off from Reserve Gully
at 9 a.m. in company with
Capt. Baynam to view Turks
country from Steele's Post. In
Monash Valley met old friend
of "Seeangbee" days in Capt.
Ritchie N.Z.M.O. who asked to
accompany us. After precipitous
climb reached benches.

Capt. Seoman ^{1st Lt.} showed
us round, when in a narrow
communicating funnel, a
Turkish 8" shell arrived &
blew us into a heap seven
of us. All badly shaken
Ritchie especially so, & also

burnt, for his shirt set on fire.
Cannon shaken, self too
legs burnt & right ear hurt.
A miraculous escape from death,
horrible sensation & smell of
fumes beastly. Returned to
Camp, very bad night. Next
day 4th field ambulance &
stayed with Litter who is
awfully good. Pain in ear
& head intense. Sunday M.O.
sent me here at 11 a.m.
Hot Bath, Bed, Foments for ear
Fairly good night.

Road from Maidos to
Sed-el-bahr (10 years)

Leaving Mairdos one follows
the southern road up the vineyards
towards the Turkish villages
called Magran or Tekke which
one must leave on the left. After
3 hours journey one gets to Krithia.
This is all uphill to Krithia. One
must avoid the water in the wells
of this village. The Greeks threw
a lot of copper in these wells to
avoid the copper being seized
by the Turks.

Sed-el-Bahr is visible from
Krithia. The country between
Krithia and Sed-el-Bahr is
low lying. It consists of a
cultivated plain. The country
round Krithia is very rich
consisting of cereals. Descending
from Krithia one crosses
the plain on the right of

which is a Turkish cemetery
visible in the distance on a pc
of the Cypress trees. The village
of Sed-el-Bahr is quite close
to the forts.

Nearly all the plains of the
Peninsula are cultivated &
it would be easy to get fodder
for cavalry.

Informant says that ^{it} is probable
that the Turks would poison
the wells when evacuating
country. They were going to do
this in the Balkan War.

Roads

From Sed-el-Bahr to Mairdos
there is a good road made
by the Turks for the use of
troops. Two carts can go
abreast, the road is metalled.
There is a road from Pera Orasi

to Kalid Bahr and from
~~Maitos~~ Pera Orasi to Maitos.
From Pera Orasi through Kojak
Dere, Buyak Anafarta, Kuyak
Anafarta, to Epelmar Bay there
is only a footpath.

From Maitos there is one road
suitable for carts goes northwards
through Bakhali, Kharabali,
Bergas and then south to
Gallipoli.

Another road for wheeled transport
travels along the south side
of the Peninsula along the sea
to Gallipoli. From Gaba
Tebe to Maitos the country
is flat and carts could
travel over it.

Nature of Country.

Between Krithia + Pera Orasi
the country is slightly undulating

with small hills and scrub and
between Pera Orasi + Kalid Bahr
on the E side of the road the
hills are considerably higher.

Water.

At Sed-el-Bahr there is plenty
of water from springs, also in
Krithia.

Between Sed-el-Bahr + Maitos
there are two large farms with
plenty of water, besides numerous
springs. In Maitos town there
is plenty of good water.

The informant, Speros, remained
in Maitos during the last war
and states that during the
summer the Turks could find
plenty of water for 2000 horses
besides cattle, and for 50,000
troops, besides the people of the
town numbering 10,000. In

Maitos every 10 or 15 houses has a spring of water. At all the farms and villages in the Peninsula there is water.

FUEL

Fuel for burning is brought from woods east of Bakali for the people in the town and villages and in Lapsaki in Asia it is brought across the Dardanelles in boats for use of the troops.

Position of Guns.

During the war between Italians and Turks, the Turks placed their guns in all the high places near the sea on both sides.

These positions cannot be seen from the sea. They were field guns and were taken up by horses.

Recently other permanent gun

positions have been made but these he cannot indicate.

BULAIR town is flat, but on the South side there are small hills where the Turks have artillery in positions.

MAITOS is a town of 10,000 nearly all Greeks. Half of these bolted eight months ago and some since. There are two piers inside the port.

Boats of 80 to 100 tons can go alongside.

Ten boats can go alongside the piers at the one time. All food & munitions are landed there except the big guns which are landed at KHELIA BAY where there is a pier. At the east side of the pier there are large goods sheds belonging

to private people. These were taken over by the Government during the last war, and have been taken over again now. They are used for storing all kinds of war material and food.

On the south west side of the port are four large Greek Schools. These in the last war were used as a Hospital.

The left bank of the Asmak Dere affords a position to cover the landing of a force at this point. To move guns inland it would be necessary to take a track, which leaves the shore 150' N of the mouth of the Asmak Dere. This track follows the course of a small tributary of the Asmak Dere for a short distance and joins the Eski Heni - BUYAK ANAFARTA ROAD about a mile from the landing place. There is no obstacle to moving off the track. There are some fisherman's huts at KABA TEPE.
